

WHAT DOES THE LIFE OF A NIGERIAN WOMAN LOOK LIKE?

The 2013 Nigeria Demographic and Health Survey (NDHS) provides data for monitoring the population and health situation in Nigeria. The 2013 NDHS is the 5th DHS survey conducted in Nigeria since 1990. 38,948 women in all selected households were interviewed—here is what their life looks like.

Teenage Motherhood by Education Level Percent of young women age 15-19 who are pregant or already mothers



Teenage pregancy decreases with education. Half of young women age 15-19 with no eduation have begun childbearing compared to only 2% of young women with more than secondary edcuation.
