

2008–09 Kenya Demographic and Health Survey (KDHS)


The 2008–09 Kenya Demographic and Health Survey (KDHS) provides up-to-date information on the population and health situation in Kenya. The 2008–09 KDHS is the fifth national demographic and health survey conducted in the country.

The survey is based on a nationally representative sample. It provides estimates for rural and urban areas of the country and for each of the eight provinces. The survey also included HIV testing.



Reasons for Not Delivering at a Health Facility


Percent of women with a live birth in the 5 years before the survey who did not deliver at a health facility by reason for not delivering in a health facility 42____

Under-five Mortality by Province


Deaths per 1,000 births for the 10-year period before the survey



Trends in Family Planning Use




Trends in Vaccination Coverage Percent of children 2003 2008-09




Trends in ITN Ownership


